Brazoria County, per its Citizen Participation Plan, uses several methods for encouraging citizen participation. #### Citizen Comment Documentation

Describe any efforts to notify and accommodate those with modified communication needs, such as posting information and providing interpretive services for other languages.

The public and local social service organizations were notified in English and Spanish via public posting, the County's website, and in writing to Community Food Pantry, Actions Inc of Brazoria County, American Legion, Habitat for Humanity of Southern Brazoria County, and Community Foundation of Brazoria County. Vietnamese translation is available upon request.

The item was placed on Commissioner's Court agenda on May 9<sup>th</sup>, 2023 for the public and all amendment documents made available to commissioners and the public via the agenda packet. This location is ADA compliant. Any special accommodations requested to attend Commissioner's Court is always granted within the controls of the County, if given reasonable time to do so.

## **Long-Term Planning and Recovery**

Below is an explanation of how the region's method of distribution fosters long-term community recovery that is forward-looking and focused on permanent restoration of infrastructure, housing, and the local economy.

Parts of Brazoria County sustained a significant damage during the 2016 flood event because of inadequate streets/roads and drainage systems. The County will focus on mitigating the physical drainage and streets/roads conditions that contributed to regional flooding and related property damage. As a result of these failures to function, the County will prioritize drainage and streets/roads activities in support of housing for infrastructure projects, specifically those that benefit low-and-moderate income areas.

Brazoria County's distribution plan fosters long term community recovery by collectively addressing regional failures to function that affected multiple neighborhoods in both unincorporated and incorporated areas of the County. Drainage and street/roads improvements will reduce the impact of flooding on housing, personal property, and public infrastructure. This plan provides for an efficient, uniform implementation of housing and infrastructure assistance by the County.

## **Unmet Housing Needs**

Below is an explanation of how unmet housing needs will be addressed or how economic revitalization or infrastructure activities will contribute to long-term recovery and restoration of housing in the most impacted and distressed areas.

Brazoria County attempted to provide housing assistance in support of LMI households in the form of rehabilitation assistance. However, once the County held intakes and conducted preliminary inspections, it soon discovered that damage to homes was far worse than anticipated. Thus, the estimated cost of repairs exceeded the state's rehabilitation cap and most, if not all, applicants qualified for replacement/reconstruction. Despite the efforts of the County, only two (2) households qualified for the program for replacement housing. Several reasons factored into this including the COVID-19 pandemic, the availability of the Hurricane Harvey Housing Assistance Program (HAP) and the sheer difficulty in qualifying for the program. Hurricane Harvey impacted the same area as the 2016 Floods and offered better benefits programs. Additionally, most of the homes damaged in the 2016 floods were also impacted by Hurricane Harvey making it almost impossible to determine storm tie-back to 2016 with an inspection. Additionally, since the formation of the original MOD, the County's priorities have shifted toward street improvements mainly for two reasons: shifting priorities and actionable projects. Though flood and drainage is still a priority, the County believes residents' ability to evacuate efficiently on safe roads during disasters is increasingly crucial. Additionally, given the approaching state contract end date for the B352 infrastructure project, street construction is historically faster than flood and drainage and have a higher likelihood of being successfully completed in a timely manner. New streets also drain much better than failing streets and roads.

Due to the difficulties in qualifying applicants for the housing program and subsequent surplus of housing funds and the shifting focus to streets for the aforementioned reasons, the County seeks to amend the method of distribution to reflect the following:

- Update the County's priorities to include single-family housing replacement;
- Update the County's priorities to include street improvements, and;
- Reallocate \$999,999 of the housing surplus to infrastructure to serve the need for street improvements By reallocating a portion of housing funds to infrastructure and shifting the focus toward actionable, beneficial street improvement projects that ultimately support housing, the County believes it will promote long term recovery in residential areas that were most impacted by high water and the failure to function of targeted drainage systems and street/roads during the 2016 flood event.

#### Method of Distribution Detail

The County is required to prepare a method of distribution between the eligible entities or projects. The GLO has directed the County to use a direct allocation technique based on objective, verifiable data. The Method of Distribution will identify how it meets benefiting 70% low-to-moderate persons requirement., supports minimum allocation amounts that help ensure project feasibility, and provides an explanation of the distribution factors selected.

## **Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Statement**

All subrecipients will certify that they will affirmatively further fair housing ("AFFH") in their grant agreements and will receive GLO training and technical assistance in meeting their AFFH obligations. Additionally, all project applications will undergo AFFH review by GLO before approval. Such review will include assessment of a proposed project's area demography, socioeconomic characteristics, housing configuration and needs, educational, transportation, and health care opportunities, environmental hazards or concerns, and all other factors material to the AFFH determination. Applications should show that projects are likely to lessen area racial, ethnic, and low-income concentrations, and/or promote affordable housing in low-poverty, nonminority areas in response to

natural hazard related impacts.

#### **Distribution Factors**

The County has selected the following distribution factors:

The County will administer all local Disaster Recovery funds for both infrastructure and housing projects and will not make distributions to eligible entities. This decision was based on the following: (1) the cities impacted by the disaster events agree that the most significant impacts of the disaster were regional in nature; (2) all parties agree that given the regional extent and systemic interdependence of the impacts and any proposed solutions, the County is the logical entity to administer these funds; and (3) cities with major housing impacts agreed that the county has the experience and capacity necessary to complete housing projects in an efficient and uniform manner.

All allocations must meet or exceed a floor of \$100,000 to help ensure sufficient funds for at least one eligible project.

## **Eligible Activities**

Grantee activities must be specifically related to 2016 disaster(s), and must meet the following criteria:

- Activity must be a CDBG-eligible project.
- Activity must be in response to a 2016 disaster(s) related impact in one of the following ways:
  - o Direct verifiable damage from the disaster(s) that requires improvement of conditions, or
  - The facilities must have failed to function in the normal capacity as a result of the disaster(s).
- The County has added a stipulation that projects must meet a regionally established recovery priority.

The County has addressed prioritization of eligible activities as follows:

The County has determined that recurrent flooding due to inadequate regional drainage and street facilities has resulted in an increasing priority of street improvement projects in support of housing, which has been reflected below. In recognition of housing needs, the County has determined that the direct housing assistance allocation should be reduced due the fact that most homeowners were assisted through Hurricane Harvey Housing Assistance Program, insurance, FEMA Individual Assistance and/or SBA loans or lacked adequate tie-back for this program, and to support high-priority and actionable street projects. Additionally, the County has determined that single-family replacement and reconstruction was/is a much higher need in the County versus rehabilitation due to the estimated cost of repairs being so high due to amount of damage as well as escalating construction costs.

## **Reallocation of Funds**

The county must identify the process of reallocation of funds from de-obligated funds and/or cost savings from completed projects:

Brazoria County experienced cost savings on the flood and drainage activities. Additionally, it experienced a lack of demand and/or unqualified applicants for housing assistance which also resulted in unspent funds. The GLO has approved an amendment to add street improvements projects to the County's infrastructure contract on which the County will expend the surplus from the original flood and drainage facilities projects. Due to high construction costs, an unstable market, and just sheer volume of street work that is needed in the County, the County requests that \$999,999.00 of the unspent housing funds be infused into the infrastructure contract to support streets projects. The County requests that the MOD simply reflect the evolution of needs, priorities, and results of the sealed-bidding process.
