




Brazoria County Veterans Day Committee members have announced that Lake Jackson will be the host city for the 2002 Veterans Day Parade and Program that will be Monday, Nov. 11.

The parade whose theme is "Marching with Heroes" will begin at 11 a.m. and will proceed down Lake Road from Highway 332 intersection to MacLean

The "Salute to Veterans' Program" will be in the Park's Pavilion at about 12:30 p.m.

The event will be the fourth consecutive year in which the veterans of Brazoria County

LAKE JACKSON — Col. Otis Taylor was in Northern Italy the day Adolph Hitler died.

The retired U.S. Army colonel, a Lake Jackson resident, was with the 10th Mountain Division near Lake Garda on April 30, 1945, and they had several German units pinned down in a large valley. So large, Taylor and company were able to see down into the cockpits of friendly P-47 and P-38 airplanes as they strafed and dive-bombed the enemy below.

"As we sat on top of large boulders and watched the war in Italy winding down, we had a ringside seat to the greatest show on Earth," he told a gathering of about 100 people at the Lake Jackson Civic Center on Monday. "At least it was a great show for its."

The three-time recipient of

the Bronze Star was one of four speakers at a Veterans Day celebration at the center Monday morning. Vets from the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Women's Auxiliary Services, Coast Guard and Merchant Marine were honored at the gathering, one day after Veterans Day.

"We did not know what

"We did not know what was happening across Italy, east and west of us, but our part of the war was coming to an end," Taylor said. "On May 2, we received orders to cancel all patrols and fire only if fired on. It was over."

But some wounds of war last a lifetime, said Capt. Kerry Magee, retired from the U.S. Navy.

"Some vets have visible signs of service ... A missing limb, a jagged scar or a look in their eye," said Mage, of Churchill. "They may have shrapnel or an inner steel. You can't tell a vet just by looking. A Prisoner of War who went away one person and came back another, or who didn't come back at all.

who didn't come back at all.

"He's the old guy bagging groceries, painfully slow now, wishing his wife were still

alive to hold him when the nightmares still come." Sgt. Jack Thomson, retired

Sgt. Jack Thomson, retired from the U.S. Army, focused more on humor in uniform, telling of a long march in which he carried a 48-pound machine gun and tripod and fell in the mud.

"I cursed everything from Hitler to Roosevelt," said the Lake Jackson resident. A three-day pass to England helped ease the pain of a 138pound soldier's muddy march.

"Now we're old men," he said. "We were not unique. We answered the call."

Thomson lamented wars of the past 50 years, not finding any humor in what he called using military conflict for political gain.

political gain.
"That's despicable," he said to a quiet crowd.

Sgt. Bob Johnson, a U.S. Army retiree of Lake Jackson, received a Purple Heart for injuries suffered in Okinawa, Japan. He found a way to laugh about hard times gone by. "The thing about this"
Purple Heart is, in Texas, you can get a license plate for \$3," he said as attendees laughed.

he said as attendees laughed. All four speakers retired from Dow following their military service. Magee urged citizens to

Magee urged citizens to honor veterans. Not just on Veterans Day, but all year. American liberty doesn't come from politicians, reporters, preachers or attorneys, but those who've fought or died to preserve that freedom, he said.


"When you see somebody who has served our country, just lean over to them and say, 'thank you,'' Magee said. "The men and women who served are true American heroes. Show them your appreciation.







Brazoria honors fallen warriors with memorial.

ayor Ken Corley is impressed with the city's new veterans memorial, which was unveiled Sunday.

"It's probably the most significant piece of art in the city," Corley said.

The black granite memorial showcases the names of every Brazoria resident who was killed in war since 1832.

"This is a unique memo-rial," said Bob Schwebel. president of the Brazoria Heritage Foundation. "This one goes back to the Republic of Texas."

Four years of planning and \$30,000 went into the project, Schwebel said. The heritage foundation and the Brazoria Lions Club teamed up to compile the names of those who died fighting in the battle of Velasco, the Alamo, Goliad, the Meir Expedition, the Civil War, World War I, World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War and Operation Enduring

Freedom in Iraq.
"This is the first one anywhere," Corley said,

referring to the scope of the monument.

The memorial also has a spot dedicated to local first responders who died on duty. There currently are no names on that spot.


"We hope it stays blank," Schwebel said.

The memorial, located near the entrance to the Brazoria Civic Center and Museum at 202 Smith St., features four granite bench-es encircling a concrete slab emblazoned with a large Texas star. The granite memorial sits on the north side of the slab against a grassy mound and flagpole. Oleander plants will be placed on either side of the memorial. Behind the memorial is an 8- by 12foot mural featuring Stephen F. Austin. Denise and Jo Ann Cerventes cre-ated the colorful mural. which shows the "Father of Texas" on his horse, Ned.

Bryson Memorials of Angleton installed the memorial, which still needs some cosmetic touches to be finished, Corley said. The mayo believes the memorial will serve as a patriotic reminder to residents of the sacrifices past residents made.

"They're going to take more pride in the commu-nity," Corley said. "We're proud to be Brazorians, and I think this displays

"Right here is where the state of Texas was born — right here," Hickey said.


Afterward, he invited everyone to tour the new World War II exhibit at the nearby Freeport Historical Museum. Next year's Veterans

"This will be a great way to commemorate and honor our veterans," he said. "Brazoria County cares about their veterans and the military and the city of Angleton is proud to be hosting it."



It doesn't matter how exciting, boring, or crazy things might have been, they should be shared with loved ones, especially younger generations, Broadway said.

As a veteran of the Vietnam War, Rinehart said he couldn't describe what an honor it was to host the Veterans Day celebration in

They guard the Tomb of the Unknowns

Hurricane Isabel struck Washington, D.C., hard that night.

It was Sept. 18, 2003. I lived in Alexandria, Va., at the time. I rode out the storm reading a book and enjoying a glass of wine.

At the Arlington National Cemetery, just a few miles from where I sat, the sentinels who stand guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns were having an entirely different experience.

The Tomb of the Unknowns was established in 1921. Three of its chambers contain the remains of unknown soldiers from World War I, World War II and Korea (a fourth chamber had contained the remains of an unknown soldier from the Vietnam war until DNA technology determined his identity).

Only the finest soldiers are selected to guard the Tomb. The sentinels are specially trained soldiers of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment (The Old Guard). They

watch over the Tomb 24 hours a day, seven days a week. As each solitary guard paces before the Tomb, his movements are precise, his dress impeccable.

Each guard's dedication is made clear by the Sentinel's Creed:

- My dedication to this sacred duty is total and wholehearted.
- In the responsibility bestowed on me never will I falter.
- And with dignity and perseverance my standard will remain perfection.
- Through the years of diligence and praise and the discomfort of the elements,
- I will walk my tour in humble reverence to the best of my ability
- It is he who commands the respect I protect.

His bravery that made us so proud.

Surrounded by well-meaning crowds by day, alone in the thoughtful peace of night, this

under my eternal vigilance. Which brings us back to Hurricane Isabel.

For the first time in the Tomb's history, in preparation of a potentially

dangerous storm, the commanding officers established a contingency

The sentinels were free to withdraw to safer positions under the Memorial Amphitheater arches or inside the trophy room should conditions become life-threatening -- positions from which they could still maintain their mission watching over the Tomb.

But none would leave. It is a solemn duty to march

before the Tomb, after all. The sentinel's meticulous ritual is an outward display of gratitude and remembrance for the sacrifices so many have made for their country - particularly the unknown soldiers who made the ultimate sacrifice.

By guarding the Tomb with eternal vigilance, the sentinel validates the words of the soldier's prayer:

"It is the soldier who has given us our freedoms. It's the soldier, not the reporter, who has given us freedom of the press. It's the soldier, not the poet, who has given us freedom of speech. It's the soldier, not the campus organizer, who has given us the freedom to object. It's the soldier, not the lawyer, who has given us the right to a fair trial.."

And so, as Hurricane Isabel struck - 24 trees would be uprooted across the cemetery and three headstones would be crushed -- each sentinel took turns standing his ground.

There really was no other option. How could a sentinel retreat to safer ground in the midst of a dinky hurricane when so many others have given so much more?

It's true the hurricane could have

been plenty worse than it turned out to be. It's possible that life-threatening severity might have caused the sentinels to, for the first time since they began guarding the Tomb in 1948, maintain their mission from safer ground.

Though I doubt it.

We've gone through some wrenching political seasons -- some

folks are jubilant at the results, whereas others are deflated -- but despite the disagreement over policies and politics, I'm confident America will do the right thing over the long haul.

I'm confident America's best is yet


I believe this because virtue still lives in America. Honor, sacrifice

and duty are still alive and well.

If you don't believe me, pay a visit to the Arlington National Cemetery and stop by the Tomb of the Unknowns.

It is one place where American sacrifice, duty and honor are on full display 24 hours a day every day of the week.

At the end of the route, parade participants and viewers will then proceed to the stadium, where the county's tribute to veterans will start about 12:15 p.m.


"This year fifth-grade students from all the districts were invited to write essays about patriotism and being a veteran, and there are rewards for the best essay from each school," said Moody.

students decorated their float with paper poppies, each one honoring a late ancestor, who served in the military — an homage to the poem "In Flanders Fields," written during World War I.


